Let imaginations run wild at Creation Station! After looking at photos of native masks from around the world, children will create their own wearable masks and sun visors as well as other fun art projects. For most of the projects in the KidZone, there will be a small fee to cover material costs.

And don't miss the Kidz-Only Shop (no adults!), where all pieces will be created and donated by the artists participating in the Festival, priced at levels kids can afford from .50 to \$10. It's a great way for kids to learn about decision-making and have fun! Odds and ends and fun bags of art materials will also be available for kids to purchase for \$1 and take home to work on their own projects.

year. Festival artists donate pieces priced to match kids' wallets. Kids purchase art under the supervision of adults but not under their parents' guidelines! All art in the Kidz-Only Shop is priced between \$0.50 and \$10.

The Kidzone is open to the public during all Festival hours.
